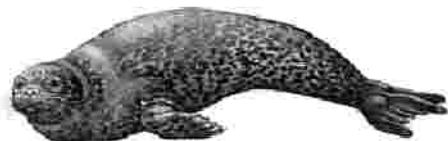
Letter from the President

SENEME was proud to announce the recipients of the 2010 Marine Educator of the Year and Life Member Awards at this year's Annual Conference.

The 2010 Marine Educator of the Year Award was presented to Vicki Sawyer, an Aquarist at The Maritime Aquarium at Norwalk. This award is given for effective and innovative teaching by either a classroom teacher or a professional not in the classroom. Vicki began her career as a volunteer with The Maritime Aquarium (TMA), then worked as an aquarium educator and finally moved to the husbandry staff. For the past 22 years, Vicki has been welcoming visitors to the Aquarium with her three-times-daily seal feedings. As described by the Director of Education at TMA, these programs are structured and interactive and include a brief welcome followed by explanations of seal biography, behavior and care, population dynamics and ecology and a conservation message. The presentations are always followed by public Q & A sessions that last long after the feedings have completed.

Vicki's impact on marine education extends beyond the public presentations with her dedicated work as a mentor to volunteers and interns at TMA. Over the past 8 years, she has mentored over 88 college students and 120 high school students; taking the time to engage, educate and encourage these students in their quest for knowledge.

The 2010 Life Member Award was presented to Katrina Barrett, an Educator at the Mystic Aquarium & Institute for Exploration. This Award is the highest recognition the Association offers and is reserved for those individuals who have demonstrated a distinguished career in teaching, research or service to marine education. Trina has been an active SENEME Board member for over 20 years, and she just celebrated her 35th Anniversary at Mystic Aquarium. During her tenure at the Aquarium, she has worked with the youngest of learners - focusing her energy and enthusiasm for learning on children in preschool and grades K-6. Trina schedules and teaches the Aquarium's system-wide programs and conducts outreach programs featuring teachers in costumes of marine animals.

Trina's dedication to SENEME has been shown through her recruitment of new members and Board members, as well as serving as Recording Secretary, Editorial Assistant and Co-Chair of the 2002 NMEA Auction Committee. "She used her meticulous attention to detail to ensure this large event was a success." Trina has also been a well-loved presenter at SENEME conferences, presenting her work on art and literacy in science.

HURRICANES: SCIENCE AND SOCIETY WEBSITE

The University of Rhode Island Graduate School of Oceanography (URI/GSO) has launched one of the most comprehensive Internet resources on hurricanes, Hurricanes: Science and Society (HSS) at <http://www.hurricanescience.org>. The HSS website and its associated educational resources provide information on the science of hurricanes, methods of observing hurricanes, modeling and forecasting of hurricanes, how hurricanes impact society, and how people and communities can prepare for and mitigate the impacts of hurricanes.

In addition to in-depth science content, the website includes educational resources, case studies, and a historical storm interactive. Information is tailored for specific audiences, including middle school through undergraduate educators and students, the general public, and the media. All content has undergone rigorous peer review by an esteemed panel of hurricane experts.

The development of the HSS website was led by GSO's Gail Scowcroft and Isaac Ginis, and designed in coordination with Raytheon Web Solutions. The website made possible by a grant from the Informal Science Education Program of the National Science Foundation.

SOUND NOTES FROM THE WATER COLUMN

It was a cool October morning, the leaves were just beginning to change on Bushy Point and Pine Island, and the water was flat calm. There was a slight mist rising from the bay which shrouded the boats and buoys with thin veils of ephemeral vapors. As the sun began to inch above Bluff Point, the leaves on the island and shore began to reveal their colors. Steve Brown and Chris Ozmun were unpacking some of their gear at the Project Oceanology parking lot, preparing for their presentation at the SENEME Fall Conference. Steve and Chris informed me that they were also participating in my afternoon workshop of snorkeling the south-side of Pine Island. Up until I met the rest of the workshop participants, I did not think any SENEME Conference goers were crazy enough to jump into the cool October waters to go snorkeling. As soon as I met the balance of the group, Lance Arnold and Matt Shardt, however, I was assured that there were people that love being in the water and would not balk at the opportunity. Of course, this was over coffee and donuts in the warmth of the campus cafeteria.

After bolting some lunch down, I rushed to the docks to find Lance, Matt, Chris and Steve patiently waiting, and after donning my wet suit, we were off. We decided to explore a strip of rocky coast in an embayment of Pine Island in Fishers Island Sound. We anchored up in an unusually low tide between a large hummock of rocks and shore where we felt relatively protected. Lance was the first into the water and with only a wet suit top, he was off exploring. Before we could get in ourselves, Lance was bringing specimens back for his aquaria. Luckily, Matt brought a cooler which we commandeered as our official specimen tank. I timidly slipped into the water expecting However, the wetsuit did its job, and I became acclimated quickly. The initial shock was replaced with a rush of excitement. The visibility was spectacular for being in Fishers Island Sound. The bottom features were interesting, and there was plenty to see.

The final tally of observed and or captured organisms included several skates, blood stars, urchins, mussels, whelks, large sea stars, a blackfish, and wonderful crops of algae. The group agreed that this was worth the effort, and we returned to the conference looking forward to the clambake waiting for us. I would like to thank Lance, Steve, Chris and Matt for signing up for the workshop, because it was offered as an experimental choice for the conference, and I would not have had the impetus to go out on my own.

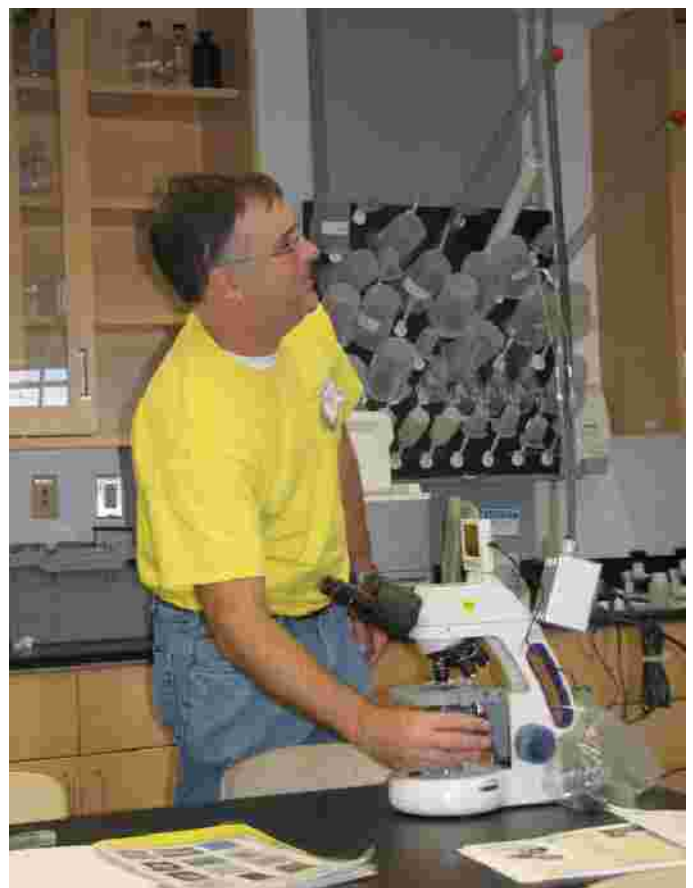
